Ordinary Time



Most of the church year is organized around the two major festivals that mark sacred time — Christmas and Easter. The rest of the year is known as **Ordinary Time.** This term comes from the word "ordinal," which means "counted time." Ordinary Time begins with Trinity Sunday and ends with Christ the King Sunday. The Sundays of Ordinary Time are often used to focus on various aspects of faith, especially the mission of the church in the world. Some ministers use Ordinary Time to focus on specific themes of interest or importance to their congregation, or build sermons around the Lectionary readings.

The sanctuary color for Ordinary Time is green, a color traditionally associated with new life and growth.

The Affirmation of Faith

from the Confession of 1967, Presbyterian Church (USA)

To be reconciled to God is to be sent into the world as God's reconciling community.

This community, the church universal, is entrusted with God's message of reconciliation and shares God's labor of healing the enmities which separate people from God and from each other.

Christ has called the church to this mission and given it the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The church maintains continuity with the apostles and with Israel by faithful obedience to his call. The life, death, resurrection, and promised coming of Jesus Christ has set the pattern for the church's mission.

His life as a human person involves the church in the common life of all humanity.

His service to people commits the church to work for every form of human well-being.

His suffering makes the church sensitive to all the sufferings of humankind so that it sees the face of Christ in the faces of people in every kind of need.

His crucifixion discloses to the church God's judgment on humankind's inhumanity to people and the awful consequences of its own complicity in injustice.

In the power of the risen Christ and the hope of his coming the church sees the promise of God's renewal of human life in society and of God's victory over all wrong.

The church follows this pattern in the form of its life and in the method of its action.
